Father's Day

Father's Day, which is celebrated on the third Sunday of June in many countries, honors fathers and fatherhood, paternal bonds, and father's influence in the community.

It wasn't until 1972 during the President Nixon's administration that Father's Day was officially recognized as a national holiday. President Calvin "Silent Cal" Coolidge in 1924 recommended that Father's Day become a national holiday, but no official action was taken. About 42 years later in 1966 President Lyndon B. Johnson, through an executive order, designated the third Sunday in June as the official day to celebrate Father's Day.

West Virginia, United States is where the first recorded observance of Father's Day was held on July 5, 1908. Either Mrs. Grace Golden Clayton or Jessica Clinton Clayton in Fairmont suggested the Williams Memorial Methodist Episcopal Church South hold a special service to honor 361 individuals - most of who were fathers - who had died in a coal mine explosion seven months earlier. This Father's Day service was an isolated event that wasn't repeated in later years, nonetheless, West Virginia erected a historical marker in 1985 claiming credit for holding the first Father's Day observance, but they do not claim credit for promoting the idea as a national holiday.

Promoting the idea as a national holiday goes to Sonora Smart Dodd, a young woman from Spokane, Washington State. Credited as the original and most influential proponent of Father's Day, the first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910 when she came up with the idea of honoring and celebrating her father while listening to a Mother's Day sermon at church in 1909. She believed mothers were getting all the accolades while fathers were equally deserving of a day of praise. Her dad, William Smart who was quite a man and a veteran of the Civil War, was left a widower when his wife died while giving birth to their sixth child. He went on to raise the six children by himself on their small farm in Washington. To show her appreciation for all the hard work and love he gave to her and her siblings, she thought there should be a day to pay honor to him and other dads like him. Initially she suggested the anniversary of her father's death – June 5th - to be the designated day to celebrate Father's Day, but due to some bad planning, the celebration in Spokane, Washington was deferred to the third Sunday in June.

In the United States Virgin Islands, Father's Day is celebrated on the third Sunday of June, as well. On their special day, fathers are treated to special dinners and luncheons held in their honor. In the Frenchtown area on St. Thomas, USVI, special weekendlong events are held in celebration of fathers to promote fatherhood, paternal bonds, and the influence of fathers in our community.



Suggested Classroom and Family Activities:

Study the origin and purpose of Father's Day, and creatively share it with someone.

Attend church service and/or special Father's Day program with your dad, grandpa, and/or special dad in your neighborhood / community. Create a special gift and/or special treat, which truly expresses your love for your dad, grandpa, and/or special dad in your neighborhood / community. Spend the day with your dad and/or grandpa doing what he loves to do (for example at a sporting event, barbecuing, gardening, etc.)
